Real Hams Don't Read or Do they?



If you recognize that the inspiration for this article title came from an early 1980's bestselling book titled "Real Men Don't Eat Quiche", then maybe you are on your way to proving this theory wrong. On the other hand, there is evidence to support the hypothesis that hams don't read, and they are proud of it. I was recently directed to a manufacturer in the box instructions as how pervasive this may be and how this manufacturer is dealing with it.

JUMPSTART, OR "REAL HAMS DON'T READ MANUALS!"

Ok, but at least read this one section before operating.

Maybe it's more that hams don't read what we want them to. So, then the question we need to answer is, HOW can we communicate to an

unreceptive audience? Has the tradition of using the "newsletter" lost its effectiveness? I have had the privilege of knowing some of the Division's best ham club newsletter editors, not just that they were good, but have awards to substantiate it. When asked why I didn't see any club newsletter anymore, they all answered the same that they had given up. No one reads them anymore.

We know hams are not inherently illiterate. Given a technical problem, they'll dig into written documents, manuals, high tech studies with the best of them.

I conclude it must not be just the ability to read the written word. It must be something to do with the "got to want to theory". At first, I concluded that it might have something to do with the 14th century Gutenberg method, yes, the printed word. But E-books, Email, and the internet don't seem to change the outcome. How do we instill the desire to communicate accurately and effectively in ways the ham community wants to participate?

Social Media seems to be attractive in many circles where it clearly attracts similar opinions and like minds but can negatively impact holistic discussions and goals by promoting only personal passions, obscuring facts, and truly objective ideas.

I often hear a comparison of our hobby to many other large organizations having similar struggles. We have a huge advantage in that our hobby has a massive variety of aspects driven by some of the most intelligent and passionate people in the world. That advantage can also be a struggle where it is human nature to feel that one's individual passion is the most important. We must not let this welcomed intensity drown out others, especially those with new passions foreign to many of us left to steward the hobby. So, the question at hand, HOW do we develop the desire and methods to communicate within the whole Amateur Radio community? Might it reside in our clubs?

I believe deeply that the ARRL is the only viable tool we have to navigate the constant political, social, technological, and environmental changes we are constantly being dealt. We just need to learn how best to communicate effectively. The League does a tremendous number of good things, but not everyone seems to care or know about them.

I often find Einstein's thought-provoking insights just what I need, "We cannot solve our problems with the same thinking we used when we created them".

The ARRL has become the new publisher of the Amateur Radio License Preparation books and related resources authored by Gordon West, WB6NOA. Gordon West's popular

books, classes, and audio courses have been a mainstay of amateur radio licensing for over 40 years. Generations of hams have learned from 'Gordo', and now the impact of his knowledge and experience will continue with the reach and resources of ARRL.

Current editions of Gordon West's popular license prep books will be available from ARRL and ARRL publication dealers soon, including:

- Technician Class FCC Element 2 Amateur Radio License Preparation, 10th Edition 2022-2026
- General Class FCC Element 3 Amateur Radio License Preparation, 11th Edition 2023-2027
- Extra Class FCC Element 4 Amateur Radio License Preparation, 8th Edition 2020-2024

The books, including future editions, will continue to be authored by Gordon West with Technical Editor Eric P. Nichols, KL7AJ. Nichols is a regular contributor to ARRL publications and has written several ARRL books. He has collaborated on the Gordon West books since 2013.

N3FJP Software Updates

The N3FJP team has been busy releasing several updates and one addition to their popular contest logging software programs.

VHF Contest Log 6.6.8 has been updated to support the Solar Eclipse QSO Party (SEQP). While the SEQP includes HF, the existing grid square exchange in the VHF software was the best fit for SEQP's inclusion. Select Solar Eclipse QSO Party in the settings menu.

RAC Contest Log 3.6.6 has been updated to support VE3RHQ point assignment.

Additionally, South Carolina QSO Party Contest Log 2.7.6 has been updated to support the 2024 rules changes, and Delaware QSO Party Contest Log 1.0.1 has been released to support the Delaware QSO Party.

Club Commission Program

One of the benefits of being an ARRL Affiliated Club is a commission for recruiting new ARRL members and securing timely ARRL member renewals. The commission structure has been updated and the process has changed to make it more lucrative and easier for the clubs. All membership dues are sent to ARRL to be processed and the club receives a commission payment directly from ARRL. No more complicated adjusting funds around credit cards, checks and cash. ARRL does all the processing. As a result, your club could earn money while promoting the many benefits and programs of ARRL to ensure that amateur radio is protected and continues to be strong.

FAQ New ARRL Affiliated Club Commission Program

- **Q**. What is the ARRL Affiliated Club Commission Program?
- **A.** The ARRL Affiliated Club Commission Program allows ARRL Affiliated Clubs to earn a commission on new and renewing regular memberships.
- **Q.** How much commission does the club earn for new and renewing members?
- **A. Each new ARRL member earns the club a \$20.00 commission.** New members are defined as never having been a member or a returning member that has not been a member for two years. Each renewal now earns the club a \$5.00 commission. There is no limit to the amount a club can earn in this program.
- **Q.** What is the process for the club?
- A. The club will follow the process for both new and renewal applications
 - Each new or renewing ARRL member should <u>fill out the membership application for Affiliated Clubs</u>.
 - 2. Payment in **FULL** can be made to ARRL by check, credit card, or cash.
 - 3. The club then sends all applications with **FULL** payment along with the Club Commission Reconciliation Form to ARRL for processing.
 - 4. The memberships are processed once received by ARRL, and the club receives the commission.
 - 5. Commission payments can be made by check to the club or Direct Deposit.
- **Q.** Can the club keep the commission from the applications before sending them to ARRL?
- A. No, the applications must have full payment, and the commission is then paid to the club.
- **Q.** Can the member combine the Club Commission with a premium or incentive offered separately by ARRL or at a Hamfest?
- **A.** No, the member will not be eligible to receive a gift or incentive if the club collects a commission on the membership.

Q. Which memberships are eligible for a commission?

A. Only regular memberships. Multiyear memberships earn only one commission. Life, Family, International, Blind, and Student memberships are not eligible for a commission.

Q. How quickly should the club expect to get a commission check?

A. A club should receive a payment within two to three weeks of ARRL receiving the forms.

Q. If we have a question on how to process the forms, who do we contact?

A. Questions can be directed to <u>clubs@arrl.org</u> or contact Member Services at ARRL.

This is a really great opportunity for your club to receive "FREE" money with very little effort, and it helps the ARRL as well.


